THE PRESIDENT SPEAKS...

Dear members,
The first six months of this year have unfortunately been very difficult months for our organisation.

With the financial crisis happening all around us, a number of sponsors have reduced their support to us. Furthermore, Nature Trust (Malta) had still to get past year grants from the authorities under the management agreements for Wied Ghollieqa and Xrobb l-Ghagin. All this, and other outstanding amounts in our accounts, created a cash flow problem for us which saw us pass through some hard times in keeping up with ongoing projects.

To add to our problems, this year also had its fair share of vandalism incidents. At Wied Ghollieqa we are finding large amounts of material dumped

on site, many young trees and shrubs stolen from our nursery, gates broken and even cats and hedgehogs drowned in the reservoir. Recently we unfortunately also experienced the theft of 170 trees and watering equipment from Xrobb l-Ghagin.

Despite all this, we will not give up but continue with our efforts. We are currently getting quotes for professional CCTV cameras for Wied Ghollieqa and are also looking into increasing CCTV cameras at Xrobb l-Ghagin

On a positive note, this year also marks our 50 years as an organisation.

We started celebrations with a tree planting event at Xrobb l-Ghagin and this was followed by the launch

of the Adopt-a-Turtle campaign in collaboration with Air Malta. Please do keep following



us on our website and on Facebook and we look forward to welcoming you during our events. At the moment we are also working on a publication dealing with endemic species and we hope to have this published soon.

We again take this opportunity to thank Mr Guido Lanfranco for setting up the Natural History Society in 1962. Over the last 50 years we managed to achieve a lot and with your support we will continue in our hard work towards our natural heritage

SUMMER ACTIVITIES

Celebrations and vandalism ...

NTM Council



An important milestone for Nature Trust (Malta) has been reached ... we are 50 years old and celebrations are ongoing. A number of events have taken place with many more to come in the summer months.

The year of celebrations was launched on the 18th April 2012 at the **Xrobb l-Ghagin Nature Park** when 50 personalities were invited to plant a tree in the park, one for every year that we were active. These personalities included the President of the Republic of Malta, **HE Dr. George Abela**, a number of politicians from the three political parties, business people, singers, TV personalities, actors and benefactors.

Unfortunately, these trees did not survive very long as on the 21st May we woke up to find that the park suffered from a theft and vandal attack despite a closed gate and functioning CCTV cameras. Over 170 newly planted trees were uprooted and a lot of watering equipment was stolen. The cost of all adds up to over 3000€.

We wish to thank you all for your kind words of encouragement and we intend to replace all trees that were stolen. We are also looking into installing more CCTV cameras on all the sites we

Busy Times for the Rescue Team ...

In order to remain as professional as possible, all rescue team members recently underwent a training course by **James Barnett** of the British Divers Marine Life Rescue, a certified NGO working on cetacean and seal rescue in UK waters. He was kind enough to provide the training for free and accommodation was sponsored by the **Corinthia Marina Hotel** for the duration of his stay.

Although stranded dolphins are not very common in Malta, dolphins have been regularly recorded in Maltese waters and for this reason the team needs to be well trained to deal with any form of stranding or injury

Another important job of the marine team deals with **turtle rescue**. So far in 2012, no injured or sick turtles have been rescued but we expect some in the summer months, when the majority of rescues take place as turtles migrate towards Malta and more people take to the sea and notice them. We urge our members to keep a sharp eye for surfacing turtles when out at sea. Remember that turtles breathe air and must surface to breathe. Unfortunately this is when they are most at risk as they risk getting injured by boats. Should you see an injured or sick turtle, call us on one of our rescue lines (**99422086** or **99422085**) and if you take the turtle up on deck, please cover it in a wet towel and keep it from moving around the boat: this will damage the turtle's plastron (the underbelly shell).

Following rescue, turtles are taken for rehabilitation at Fort San Lucjan and are then released back into the wild. So far this year two turtles, named **Fajju** and **Johnny** (*picture*), were released after undergoing surgery and complete rehabilitation.

The start of 2012 also saw the launch of the **Adopt-a-Turtle Campaign** together with **Air Malta**. Anyone adopting a turtle will receive a certificate, a small booklet about turtles and a WWF turtle soft toy together with regular updates about the turtle and an invitation to the release of the turtle once it is fully rehabilitated.

12000 People visit Xrobb l-Ghagin



Just over twelve months have passed since the Xrobb l-Ghagin Nature Park and Sustainable Development Centre was inaugurated in April 2011 and since then we have been recording the number of visitors to this park.

We are very pleased to announce that from April 2011 up to May 2012 about 8000 adults have visited the park together with 4803 students from schools in all levels of education: kindergarten, primary, secondary, post-secondary and tertiary.

An update from Pembroke

Last year NTM started working in partner with the Malta Tourism Authority on the Pembroke Natura 2000 site. While MTA focused on the restoration of the Victorian military footpath along the site and the restoration of the Madliena Tower, our organisation focused on the natural part of the project, the creation of information panels, educational material, and ecological walks and ecotourism leaflets. Various clean up events were also organised which saw many skip loads of dumped waste being removed. It was amazing to see how far certain people go into dumping in our countryside where full kitchens, dishwashers, mattresses, fridges, cans with burned oil, furniture and much more were removed. Once ready this Natura 2000 site will provide a heritage trail for all visitors to enjoy through walking, cycling and jogging. Access will also be possible to people with wheelchairs.

An update from Wied Ghollieqa

Since the last newsletter was issued, a number of interventions have been underway in the Wied Ghollieqa Nature Reserve as part of the management agreement Nature Trust (Malta) has with the Malta Environment and Planning Authority, MEPA.

For starters, the control of invasive species has always been a priority and throughout these last months the number of Prickly Pear specimens has been severely cut down from the reserve. This plant, known scientifically as *Opuntia ficus-indica*, is an alien species thought to have originated from Mexico but has since spread to the Mediterranean and has also become naturalized. Although the Prickly Pear is well known for its fruit, the biggest problem it causes is the fact that as it grows it competes with indigenous species and can triumph over them. Other species NTM are trying to control are the Castor Oil Tree (*Ricinus communis*) and the Marvel-of-Peru (*Mirabilis jalapa*).

Another intervention in the reserve was to improve access in the site itself by creating a formal walking path and clearing it from any overgrowing vegetation. Other parts of the site also had the grass cut in order to minimize the risk of grassfires that are unfortunately not unheard of in this nature reserve.

Unfortunately, this site also suffered from minor vandal attacks when culprits broke gates and sprayed graffiti or overturned a number of restored rubble walls. In the coming months we are now planning to install a number of CCTV cameras in order to deter such attacks.

If our finances allow us we hope to restore some of the vandalized gates, restore overturned rubble walls, place some steps along the dam area and finally install a set of information panels along the designated footpath.

Nature Trust (Malta) - US Embassy Collaboration

On the occasion of Earth Day, Nature Trust (Malta) held a number of activities in collaboration with the Embassy of the United States in Malta with a view to raising awareness on climate change and the need to implement mitigation measures such as using renewable sources of energy.

Peter Schubert, the director of the Richard G. Lugar Centre for Renewable Energy at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis, recently visited Malta to represent the US in providing renewable energy insights. He toured many educational institutions, government entities, and NGOs to discuss climate change and policy, as part of Malta's preparation for the United Nation's Rio+20 sustainable development conference next month.

Prof. Schubert said: "Energy and climate are two vital topics that have significant and far-reaching implications for every country – and each person – on this planet. They are global issues that have to be addressed by leaders on a comprehensive, world-wide scale, but which also require attention to detail and the participation of 'average citizens' on a daily basis. That's why we are so pleased for this opportunity to work with Malta towards lasting micro- and macro-level change for a better energy future."

The American professor started his visit with a tour of the Xrobb l-Ghagin Nature Park and Sustainable Development centre, where he spoke with a group of 150 secondary students participating in the EkoSkola programme, sharing remarks and answering questions on climate change and initiatives to mitigate its effects using renewable energy, recycling and cutting down on waste.

Later that day, Prof. Schubert was the keynote speaker at a public debate on climate change and renewable energy policy, which was organised to mark Earth Day. Biology professor **Victor Axiak** moderated the debate and the panel was made up of Resources and Rural Affairs Minister **George Pullicino**, opposition Spokesman for Environment, Sustainable Development and Climate Change **Leo Brincat**, Alternattiva Demokratika secretary general **Ralph Cassar**, ambassador for climate change **Simone Borg** and **Eman Calleja**, research fellow at the Islands and Small States Institute studying the impact of climate change on European islands.

During his visit, Prof. Schubert also conducted meetings with the Agribusiness Institute at the Malta College of Arts, Science and Technology, as well as organisations such as the Malta Resources Authority, the Malta Intelligent Energy Management Agency and the Small States Network for Economic Development. He also held talks with the Resources and Rural Affairs Minister, and the opposition's Spokesman for Environment, Sustainable Development and Climate Change.

In a separate event Prof. Schubert met with students at the boys' secondary school in Victoria and the Green Flag school in Nadur, where he was shown around by the students of the EkoSkola committee.

The Embassy of the United States in Malta has also supported Nature Trust by means of book donations to the Wied Għollieqa centre's library and to the Green Flag primary school in Nadur.

We also hope to set up parts of the barracks for facilitating fieldwork sessions and other outdoor facilities.

Blue Flag Beaches...

Blue Flag International has recently awarded Malta Blue Flag ecolabels for six beaches. These are Mellicha Bay, Bugibba Perched Beach, Qawra Rocky Beach, Ghajn Tuffieha Bay, St George's Bay and Ramla Bay in Gozo.

Having the Blue Flag status means that these bays have the four main criteria in place which include Beach Management, Health and Safety, Excellent Water Quality and the presence of Information and Environmental Education on the Beach.

In parallel to the Blue Flag beaches Golden Bay, Fond Ghadir and the Paradise Bay Hotel Beach were given the status of a Beach of Quality.



Blue Flag International is represented in Malta by Nature Trust (Malta) who is responsible for carrying out the Blue Flag International spot checks and following up applications for Blue Flag

Blue Flag is just one of five Foundation for Environmental Education (FEE) programs run by Nature Trust. The other FEE programs are EkoSkola, Young Reporters for the Environment (YRE), Learning About Forests (LeAF) and Green Key.

Nature Trust (Malta) has also been recently reconfirmed by FEE International as its representative in Malta following an audit check on the organization.
